

* Please note that Indigenous and Aboriginal are used interchangeably in this document. Our preference at U of T Law is to use Indigenous when speaking generally about First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people but some bursaries, scholarships, etc. continue to use Aboriginal.

FINANCIAL AID AT THE LAW SCHOOL

INTRODUCTION

Determining how you will finance your legal education can sometimes be an overwhelming process. The Faculty of Law at the University of Toronto wants to ensure that a legal education is financially accessible to all JD students, and the Faculty's Financial Aid Committee has strived to create a financial aid system that is transparent and equitable to all students who require assistance. The Faculty awards financial aid primarily on the basis of demonstrated financial need. Our mission statement is:

The Faculty of Law at the University of Toronto shall be accessible to the best and brightest students irrespective of financial means. The goal of the Financial Aid Program is to ensure that all of the Faculty's graduates will be able to make career choices based on interest rather than debt-induced financial pressures.

Students seeking assistance should always start with the <u>Financial Aid Office</u>, and familiarize themselves with the general types of financial aid available to all JD students, including government loans, Faculty bursaries, interest-bearing loans, and scholarships and prizes.

This guide is to be used in conjunction with the Financial Aid <u>Policies and Procedures Booklet</u>, and is aimed specifically at University of Toronto JD Students of Indigenous/Aboriginal descent (including First Nations (Status and Non-Status), Métis and Inuit). This guide is for informational purposes only. Students are responsible for confirming eligibility requirements and deadlines, as the contents of this document are subject to change. All detailed financial aid questions should be directed to the Financial Aid Office, the Manager, Indigenous Initiatives, or the administrators of external funding.

HOW FINANCIAL AID IS CALCULATED

In order to determine which students have the greatest financial need, all students are expected to access and report personal and family resources and government assistance before being considered for Faculty financial assistance. Specific rules have been set by the Financial Aid Committee with respect to the personal and family contributions that are required by the Program. These rules are set out in the <u>Financial Aid Booklet</u>.

A deemed basic budget is set by the Financial Aid Committee and applied to all students. A set of allowable expenses may be claimed in addition to the deemed basic budget is published in this booklet. A student's personal/family deemed contributions, government assistance, income from different sources and assets are then deducted from the student's allowable budget. If the allowable budget is greater than the personal/family resources and government assistance, the student may be eligible for a Faculty of Law bursary and /or an interest subsidy on eligible students' lines of credit amounts.

The Formula:

Allowable expenses + Deemed expenses - Resources (following, if applicable):

- Student personal contribution (income/assets/investments)
- Spousal deeming contribution
- External scholarships*
- Parental deeming contribution
- Summer earnings deeming contribution
- Government student loans
- = Unmet Financial Need (covered or met through a combination of bursaries and interest-free loans)

Faculty Bursaries will be allocated to students who demonstrate the greatest financial need after their personal resources and government student financial assistance have been taken into account. Bursary awards will be given to those students who qualify for an interest-free loan and who incur a minimum level of indebtedness. This minimum level changes year by year. Please see the <u>Financial Aid Booklet</u> for the most up to date rules, information and details.

*Note: Indigenous students' external funding received due to Indigenous status are not included as external scholarship

U OF T LAW AND INDSPIRE

Please note that the Faculty of Law at the University of Toronto has a special relationship with Indspire that increases the amount of financial aid available to Indigenous students. ALL INDIGENOUS STUDENTS WHO REQUIRE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE AT U OF T LAW MUST APPLY TO INDSPIRE AS WELL AS THE FACULTY'S FINANCIAL AID PROGRAM!!!

OBTAINING FUNDING FROM YOUR BAND OR NATION

FOR FIRST NATIONS STUDENTS ...

Band funding may be available for Status First Nations students. Select bands are outlined in the following pages of the booklet. To determine eligibility and availability of funding, **students must directly contact their Band's Education Office**. In Ontario, some bands have their funding administered together. For instance, the <u>Southern First Nation Secretariat</u> issues the funding for five southern Ontario reserves (including the Chippewas of Kettle and Stony Point First Nation, the Caldwell First Nation, and the Oneida Nation of the Thames). All funders have their own application forms, deadlines, policies, and priorities.

Typically, the deadline for fall funding is normally in the spring prior to the start of the fall term. Students have to re-apply for band funding every year, and there are no guarantees that funding will be granted every year. A fully funded student would receive tuition, books and a monthly living allowance. Monthly living allowances generally run from \$700 - \$1000 for a single student, or higher for students with dependants.

Please note that if a student is receiving funding from their community, including tuition and living allowances, **the funding will not be included as external scholarships**. FOR INUIT STUDENTS ...

Inuit students who were residents of the northern territories prior to the academic year may be eligible for funding support from their respective territorial governments. In Ontario, the funding is administered by the Mississaugas of the New Credit Education Office.

Please note that if a student is receiving funding from their community, including tuition and living allowances, **the funding will not be included as external scholarships**. FOR MÉTIS STUDENTS ...

The Métis Nation of Ontario administers bursaries for any student who identifies as Métis and can demonstrate financial need. There is no requirement to be a member of the Métis Nation of Ontario for these awards. Métis students from across Canada are considered.

Applications for these bursaries are administered through the central University of Toronto, with final decisions being made by the Métis Nation of Ontario. Funding applications are due in late November each year. Additional information can be accessed through this <u>link</u>.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES AVAILABLE TO INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

On the following pages of this guide, you will find a few examples of scholarships and bursaries that are available for Indigenous students studying law. <u>This list is not exhaustive</u> and please remember that the information contained in this booklet is subject to change (including due dates!); please conduct your own research to verify application deadlines and for additional opportunities using search engines such as Google and Indigenous Services Canada's Indigenous Bursaries Search tool.

Keep in mind that you should not limit yourself to Indigenous scholarship designations. There are numerous scholarships offered by companies and organizations that award financial aid, which may be applicable to you.

If an Indigenous student receives an external scholarship that is NOT tied to their status as an Indigenous person, please note that under the policies of the Financial Aid Office, 50% of the first \$15,000 and 70% of amounts higher than \$15,000 of bursary/scholarship funding will be deemed as part of students' resources. Resources for bursaries/scholarships would count against eligibility for financial aid. Students who intend to apply for external awards should review the rules and policies regarding such awards outlined in the 2021-22 <u>Financial Aid Booklet</u>. Many bursaries are accessible through Indspire's Building Brighter Futures program. All Indigenous students who apply for financial aid must also apply to Indspire, as this allows the law school to increase the overall funding available for Indigenous student financial aid (via federal grant matching program).

Note: The University of Saskatchewan, College of Law, until approximately 2019, offered a Summer Program that allowed Indigenous students to complete their property law credit the summer before they started 1L. Many law schools made offers to Indigenous students to join their JD program conditional on their successful completion of this summer program. This was not done by U of T Law but we did support Indigenous students to participate in the summer program, if they so desired.

In 2020 the College of Law <u>announced</u> they were redesigning their program. At the time of writing, it's unclear what the future of that program looks like and Indigenous students admitted to the JD program should visit the <u>Indigenous Law Centre website</u> and speak with the Manager, Indigenous Initiatives if they have questions about the program and how it fits with the JD program at U of T Law.
